By bringing together Indigenous youth with child welfare involvement, the exhibit engages all Calgarians to reflect on the lifelong impacts of childhood displacement from home communities and disconnection from family experienced by many Indigenous youth. Some of the artists who prepared this work will be available at the gallery during exhibit hours.
